
Visits of Prime Minister to Jordan, Ethiopia, and Oman (December 15-18, 2025)

During his visit to Jordan from December 15-16, 2025, Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi met His Majesty King Abdullah II ibn Al Hussein to review the full spectrum of India-Jordan relations and exchange perspectives on regional issues. The visit, which marked the 75th anniversary of diplomatic relations between the two countries, strengthened bilateral engagement, explored new avenues of collaboration for mutual growth, and reaffirmed India's commitment to regional peace, prosperity, security, and stability.



In Ethiopia, from December 16-17, 2025, Prime Minister Modi elevated India-Ethiopia bilateral ties to the level of a Strategic Partnership. Agreements were signed on cooperation and mutual administrative assistance in customs matters, and a MoU was concluded to establish a Data Centre at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Ethiopia. An implementing arrangement was finalized for cooperation in United Nations Peacekeeping Operations training, and a MoU on debt restructuring under the G20 Common Framework was signed. India doubled ICCR scholarships for Ethiopian students, provided specialized short-term courses in Artificial Intelligence under the ITEC programme, and supported the Mahatma Gandhi Hospital in Addis Ababa to enhance maternal and neonatal healthcare services.

During his visit to Oman from December 17-18, 2025, Prime Minister Modi and Omani leadership signed a Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement to strengthen economic and commercial integration, increase trade, and create a stable framework for investment and growth across major sectors. MoUs were signed in the fields of Maritime Heritage and Museums, Agriculture and Allied Sectors, and Higher Education, promoting cultural exchange, scientific collaboration, joint research, and capacity building.

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Engagements of High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur

The High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur, in partnership with the Malaysia-India Heritage Society (MIHS), organized the 5th edition of the Sentul Heritage Walk on 6 December 2025. The event drew around 70 participants, including MIHS members, High Commission officials, media representatives, and local community members, to explore the rich Indian heritage of Sentul. The walk began at St Joseph's Church Sentul with an opening ceremony attended by YB Senator Puan Saraswathy Kandasamy, Hon'ble Deputy Minister of Unity, Monsignor James Gnanapragasam, High Commissioner of India BN Reddy, and Mr Prabhakaran Nair, MIHS President. High Commissioner Reddy praised MIHS for their dedication to preserving Indian cultural heritage in Malaysia, while Puan Saraswathy highlighted Sentul's multicultural vibrancy and interfaith harmony. The three-hour walk covered 15 historic and cultural sites, including temples, schools, the Gurudwara Sahib, Chettiar Hall, and the Railway Depot, concluding at Kuala Lumpur Performing Arts Centre (KLPAC). The closing ceremony featured a presentation on Sentul Works, the Railway Depot, and KLPAC, celebrating the neighbourhood's enduring heritage.



The High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur joined the grand finale of the silver jubilee celebrations of Ramakrishna Mission Malaysia on 21 December 2025 in Petaling Jaya. The event, themed "March on and on, nor right nor left, but to the goal," was attended by over 300 participants, including devotees, community members, and High Commission officials. The ceremony was graced by Swami Vimalatmananda, Vice President of Ramakrishna Math & Ramakrishna Mission, Belur Math; Swami Supriyananda of Ramakrishna Mission Malaysia; and Swami Samachittananda, Head of Ramakrishna Mission Singapore. High Commissioner BN Reddy congratulated the Mission on 25 years of accreditation to Belur Math and lauded their efforts in promoting the teachings of Sri Ramakrishna Paramahansa, Mata Sarada Devi, and Swami Vivekananda, emphasizing unity of religion, youth empowerment, and social harmony. The event featured addresses, devotional messages, and cultural programmes, including a Tamil skit by schoolchildren and a rendition of "Ekla Cholo" by members of the Bengalee community.



High Commissioner BN Reddy met with Malaysia's Minister of Health, YB Datuk Seri Dr. Dzulkefly Ahmad, to discuss the Global Summit on Traditional Medicine in India, bilateral cooperation in health, collaboration in the pharmaceutical sector, and ways to further advance the India-Malaysia comprehensive strategic partnership in this important field.






The High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur, in collaboration with the Malaysian Association of Traditional Indian Medicine (PEPTIM), observed the 10th Ayurveda Day on 23 December 2025 at the Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose Indian Cultural Centre under the theme “Ayurveda for People and Planet.” The programme highlighted India–Malaysia cooperation in traditional medicine, featuring keynote addresses by Dr. Goh, Director of T&CM Division, who emphasized ethical practices and outcomes of recent bilateral meetings at the WHO Global Traditional Medicine Summit, and Dr. Vivekanand, First Secretary (Commerce), who underscored academic and institutional collaborations in Ayurveda. Expert talks, demonstrations, and panel discussions by Ayurveda practitioners helped dispel misconceptions and showcased the holistic and sustainable approach of Ayurveda, complemented by a special “Ayurveda Aahar” served to participants to highlight the benefits of an Ayurvedic diet.

High Commissioner BN Reddy called on the President of the Senate, Parliament of Malaysia, YB Senator Dato Awang Beme Bin Awang Ali Basah, to discuss the participation of the Malaysian parliamentary delegation in the 28th Conference of Speakers and Presiding Officers of the Commonwealth (CSPOC) to be held at the Parliament of India in New Delhi. The discussions also focused on further enhancing parliamentary cooperation, exchanges, and capacity-building programmes between the Parliaments of India and Malaysia.



The fifth edition of the bilateral joint Exercise HARIMAUSHAKTI between the Indian Army and Malaysian Army concluded on 19 December 2025 with a closing ceremony at Mahajan Field Firing Range. The two-week exercise featured a range of joint training activities aimed at enhancing interoperability and operational preparedness. Both armies are scheduled to reconvene for the sixth edition of Exercise HARIMAUSHAKTI in Malaysia in 2026.

The High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur, in collaboration with the Indian Cultural Centre, celebrated the inclusion of Deepavali in UNESCO’s Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity on 11 December 2025. Marking this milestone, festivities lit up the Kuala Lumpur skyline, with the City Hall commemorating the occasion at the iconic Menara DBKL. Celebrations were also held across Malaysia at historic and community sites, including Athi Eswaran Temple in Sentul, Torana Gate in Brickfields, and Sri Sundarajraja Perumal Temple in Klang.



The High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur hosted an Open House for Indian students pursuing higher education in Malaysia on 13 December 2025 at the Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose Indian Cultural Centre, Kuala Lumpur. Around 75 students from 20 universities attended and engaged on various aspects of their studies and welfare in Malaysia, followed by a Q&A session where Ms Rocheus Sukanya, Counsellor (Political and Education), and Mr. Rajesh Maniyil, First Secretary (Consular, Passport and Visa), addressed the students' queries



High Commissioner H.E. B.N Reddy met with Malaysia's Minister of Home Affairs, YB Datuk Seri Saifuddin Nasution Ismail, on 1 December at the Parliament to review ongoing bilateral cooperation in security and to strengthen people-to-people connections facilitated by the liberal visa regimes of both countries. They also discussed the upcoming meeting of the bilateral Joint Working Group on Counterterrorism and Transnational Crime in Delhi and explored further collaboration in areas of mutual interest.

The High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur participated in the Selangor International Book Fair from 6 to 7 December 2025 at Setia City Convention Centre, Setia Alam, promoting Study in India, various scholarships offered by the Government of India, and India's tourism attractions. The High Commission provided information and guidance to visitors interested in exploring or pursuing higher education in India.



The tenth India-Malaysia Army-to-Army Staff Talks were held in Kuala Lumpur from 1 to 3 December 2025, with the Indian Army delegation led by Maj Gen Akaash Johar, AVSM, Additional Director General (International Cooperation), engaging in constructive dialogue with the Malaysian Army delegation led by Maj Gen Dato' Rashidin Hashimi bin Ab Rashid, Assistant Chief of Staff, Operations & Training. High Commissioner BN Reddy interacted with the Indian Army delegation, discussing aspects of India-Malaysia defence cooperation. On the sidelines of the talks, the delegation also visited the Malaysian Peacekeeping Centre and the Malaysian Armed Forces Defence College in Putrajaya.

India Coast Guard Ship (ICGS) VIGRAHA arrived at Port Klang, Malaysia, on 9 December 2025 as part of its Overseas Deployment. The ship was warmly received by officers from the Malaysian Maritime Enforcement Agency and the High Commission of India. During the visit, ICG officers and crew engaged with the MMEA on various aspects of maritime cooperation, both on board and at MMEA headquarters, and also participated in beach cleanup and community welfare activities. This marked the first-ever visit of ICGS VIGRAHA to Malaysia, with personnel from Assam Rifles and NCC cadets also on board.



As part of the ICGS VIGRAHA's official visit to Port Klang, Malaysia, a reception was held on board on 10 December 2025. The event was attended by officers from the Malaysian Maritime Enforcement Agency led by First Admiral (M) Shahref Steve Mac Queen bin Abdullah, dignitaries from the Malaysian Indian community, defence attachés, veterans, and representatives from the Malaysian and Indian defence industries. High Commissioner BN Reddy highlighted the historic maritime connection between India and Malaysia and called for stronger collaboration, particularly as 2026 has been designated the ASEAN-India Year of Maritime Cooperation, while also emphasizing the role of the Aatma Nirbhar Bharat initiative in promoting self-reliance in shipbuilding.



Earlier this year, the High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur, in partnership with the Malaysia-India Heritage Society (MIHS), Melaka State Government, and Tourism Melaka, organized the Melaka Heritage Walk on 27 April 2025. YB Datuk P Shanmugam Pitchay, Melaka State EXCO for Youth, Sports and NGOs, joined the inaugural ceremony as Chief Guest, alongside High Commissioner BN Reddy and Mr. Prabhakaran Nair, MIHS President. Around 60 participants from Kuala Lumpur and other states took part, including officials, community members, and media representatives. The walk, flagged off from the Swiss Heritage Boutique Hotel, covered key landmarks showcasing Melaka's rich heritage, including Jonker Street, Cheng Hoon Teng Temple, Kampong Kling Mosque, Gurudwara Melaka, Poyyatha Vinayagar Temple, the ancestral home of Tun Tan Cheng Lock, and the Baba Nyonya Heritage Museum.



The Lal Par Saree Iconic Walk, organised by Roots of Bengal with Mokshya Arts, Culture and Heritage Society, Negeri Sembilan was celebrated on December 5. Participants came together wearing the traditional red-bordered white Lal Par Saree, a symbol of Bengali identity and grace. The event achieved national recognition in the Malaysian Book of Records for the highest number of people wearing the Lal Par Saree at a single event, highlighting strong community participation and cultural pride. The programme was attended by H.E B. N. Reddy and NSCBICC Director Madam Vijayalakshmi. The event concluded with a tribute marking the 150th anniversary of "Vande Mataram", bringing together participants and audiences in a moment of shared



The High Commission of India Kuala Lumpur, in coordination with Malaysian Labour Offices, Police, and local volunteers, intervened to assist Indian national Safiudeen Pakkeer Mohamed, who was in Malaysia for employment. The High Commission worked with his employer to ensure his dues were settled and his passport released, completed his immigration formalities, and facilitated his safe repatriation to India on 2 December 2025.

On 26 December 2025, the Indian Cultural Centre Kuala Lumpur organized a special Carnatic vocal kutcheri titled Subha Sankalpa Sangeetham by TIC Carnatic vocalist Mr. Sreekumar Ramakrishnan, accompanied by Mr. J. J. Prathap Sharma on mridangam, Ms. Aparna Menon on tanpura, Mr. Navean Jeyapalan on ghatam, and J. J. Shankara Sharma on kanjira. The performance highlighted the intricate beauty of ragas and talas as expressions of bhakti and artistry. Acting Director of ICCR KL and Counsellor (Community Affairs, Press & Information) Mr. Naveen Kumar Ramakrishna delivered the opening remarks and encouraged the performers.

The Indian Cultural Centre Kuala Lumpur, in collaboration with Kumpulan Selendang Perak and the Greentown Indian Cultural Society, Ipoh, launched a three-month outreach program running every Wednesday from December 2025 to February 2026 at the Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose Indian Cultural Centre. 

Spotlight and Opportunities in India

Indian Pharmaceutical Industry



- India has emerged as the medical tourism hub of the world providing cost-effective treatments with the latest technology enabled by several pathbreaking reforms and provisions in healthcare sector. Access to affordable HIV treatment from India is one of the greatest success stories in medicine. India is one of the biggest suppliers of low-cost vaccines in the world, thereby rightly making it the 'Pharmacy of the World'.
- According to Bain & Co, the Indian Pharmaceutical market stood at Rs. 4,71,295 crore (US\$ 55 billion) in 2025 and is expected to grow to Rs. 10,28,280-11,13,970 crore (US\$ 120-130 billion) by 2030.
- In FY24 domestic consumption was valued at Rs. 2,01,372 crore (US\$ 23.5 billion).
- The pharmaceutical industry's total turnover stood at Rs. 2,25,000 crore (US\$ 26.26 billion) in FY25 led by cardiac, gastrointestinal and anti-diabetic segments.
- India has the largest number of USFDA-compliant plants outside the US and over 2,000 WHO-GMP approved facilities, exporting to 150+ countries.
- CRDMO industry expected to double to Rs. 1,21,282 crore (US\$ 14 billion) by 2028, reinforcing India's role in global supply chains.
- PLI scheme: Rs. 15,000 crore (US\$ 2.04 billion) outlay (2020-21 to 2028-29) to boost manufacturing, investment, and product diversification.
- Strengthening of Pharmaceutical Industry (SPI): Rs. 500 crore (US\$ 60.6 million) to support pharma clusters and MSMEs in productivity, quality, and sustainability.
- Under the Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Janaushadhi Pariyojana, 16,912 Jan Aushadhi Kendras are operational as of June 30, 2025, with a target of 25,000 by March 2027, offering 2,110 medicines and 315 devices/consumables to promote affordable quality generic healthcare.
- Government disbursed Rs. 604 crore (US\$ 69.76 million) under the PLI scheme in H1 FY25.
- FDI policy: Up to 100% FDI allowed via automatic route for Greenfield pharma projects; up to 74% for Brownfield via automatic, beyond that with government approval.
- The Drugs & Pharmaceuticals sector received FDI inflow of Rs. 2,10,940 crore (US\$ 24.62 billion) from April 2000-June 2025.
- Union Budget 2025-26: Allocation of Rs. 5,268 crore (US\$ 602 million) for the Department of Pharmaceuticals, up 28.8% over previous budget estimates.

1.	Samathu	Samathu is a fiery Naga curry made with smoked pork and Mejenga chili, known for its rich, smoky flavor. A signature dish of the Sema/Sumi tribe, it embodies the bold and spicy essence of Naga cuisine.	
2.	Galho	Galho is a Naga dish similar to khichdi, made with rice, fresh greens, vegetables, and optionally meat. It is traditionally flavored with fermented soybeans or bamboo for a unique taste.	
3.	Nap Naang	Nap Naang is a chewy and delicious black rice pudding made from sticky black rice simmered in rich coconut milk, offering a comforting blend of textures and flavors. Its natural sweetness and creamy consistency make it a delightful treat.	
4.	Hinkejvu	Hinkejvu is a simple, Naga staple dish made by boiling colocasia, shredded cabbage leaves, mustard leaves, and French beans with salt. It's a fresh and flavorful accompaniment to spicy curry and rice.	
5.	Zutho	Zutho is an indigenous fermented rice beer made by the Angami tribe using sticky rice, and it plays a key role in Naga festivities. Known for its medicinal benefits, it is enjoyed during celebrations and traditional gatherings.

1.	<p>Nagaland State Museum</p> <p>The Nagaland State Museum in Kohima, opened to the public in 1970, showcases a rich collection of artefacts representing the diverse Naga tribes. It features ancient sculptures, traditional dresses, and historical inscriptions, preserving the cultural heritage of Nagaland. The museum offers insight into the state's traditions, craftsmanship, and history.</p>	
2.	<p>Tuophema Village</p> <p>Tuophema Village, one of Nagaland's ancient heritage villages, beautifully recreates a traditional Angami Naga settlement. It offers a glimpse into the centuries-old lifestyle, culture, and traditions of the Naga tribes. Visitors can experience authentic Naga hospitality, indigenous architecture, and vibrant local festivals in this preserved cultural haven.</p>	
3.	<p>Kohima War Cemetery</p> <p>Kohima War Cemetery is a memorial dedicated to the soldiers of the 2nd British Division of the Allied Forces who lost their lives in the Battle of Kohima during World War II. It houses over 1,400 graves, including British, Indian, and Commonwealth soldiers. The cemetery is renowned for its famous epitaph: "When You Go Home, Tell Them of Us and Say, For Your Tomorrow, We Gave Our Today."</p>	
4.	<p>Ruins of Kachari Rajbari</p> <p>The Ruins of Kachari Rajbari feature a unique series of mushroom-domed pillars built by the Dimasa Kachari Kingdom. These structures, dating back to the 13th century, reflect a blend of indigenous and Hindu architectural styles. The site stands as a historical remnant of the kingdom that thrived before the Ahom invasion.</p>

5.	<p>Dzukou Valley</p> <p>Dzukou Valley, nestled between Manipur’s Senapati district and Nagaland’s Kohima district, is renowned for its breathtaking natural beauty. It is famous for its seasonal blooms, including the rare Dzukou lily, and its diverse flora and fauna. The valley’s rolling green hills, pristine streams, and vibrant meadows make it a paradise for nature lovers and trekkers..</p>	
6.	<p>Khonoma Village</p> <p>Khonoma Village, located in the Western Angami Naga region, is known as the first "green village" in India due to its pioneering efforts in environmental conservation. Referred to as Khwüno-ra by the locals, it stands out for its sustainable agricultural practices and biodiversity preservation. The village is a model of community-driven ecological awareness, blending tradition with conservation.</p>	
7.	<p>Mary Help of Christians Cathedral</p> <p>Mary Help of Christians Cathedral, the main church of the Diocese of Kohima, showcases unique architecture inspired by traditional Naga houses, blending cultural heritage with religious symbolism. The cathedral features a striking 6-foot-high carved wood crucifix, one of the largest crosses in Asia. This architectural masterpiece is not only a place of worship but also a testament to the rich Naga traditions and craftsmanship</p>	
8.	<p>Shilloi Lake</p> <p>Shilloi Lake, the largest natural lake in Nagaland, is steeped in local legends and mystique. Surrounded by breathtaking landscapes, it serves as a haven for migratory birds, including the majestic Siberian Cranes. The lake is not only a natural wonder but also a site of cultural significance.</p>

- The Mission offers a variety of spiritual and wellness programs, including daily prayers and satsangs such as Ramnam Sankirtan on Ekadashi, monthly satsangs, and online classes; spiritual guidance through personal interviews and counselling; residential camps for teenagers and devotees; Yogasana classes and celebrations of the Holy Trio's birthdays along with other religious festivals; and a bookstore providing literature on spirituality and meditation. Additionally, the Mission's sub-centres in Johor and Perak host monthly satsangs and religious discourses.
- Inspired by the sacred Panchavati at Dakshineswar, Kolkata, where Sri Ramakrishna experienced profound spiritual realizations, the Panchavati Temple of Meditation in Malaysia embodies stillness, contemplation, and self-realisation. Guided by Swami Vivekananda's insight, "The greatest help to spiritual life is meditation," Panchavati offers a serene sanctuary for seekers from all walks of life. At its heart stands a sanctified shrine enshrining holy images of Sri Ramakrishna, Holy Mother Sri Sarada Devi, and Swami Vivekananda, inviting reflection on the divine presence within.
- The temple's architectural harmony, with octagonal clay-brick walls, black granite flooring, and abundant natural light, creates a calm, meditative environment, while its eco-friendly design reflects the Mission's ethos of unity between the spiritual and natural worlds. Serving as the spiritual nucleus of Ramakrishna Mission Malaysia, Panchavati provides a space for meditation, introspection, and inner growth. Though modest in scale, it evokes a profound sense of vastness and inner expansion, reminding every visitor of the boundless nature of the Self.
- Ramakrishna Mission Malaysia continues to be a beacon of spiritual enlightenment, harmony, and service, offering Malaysians and visitors alike the opportunity to meditate, reflect, and reconnect with the Divine.
