Significant Diplomatic Engagements

Prime Minister Modi Undertakes Two-Day State Visit to Bhutan:

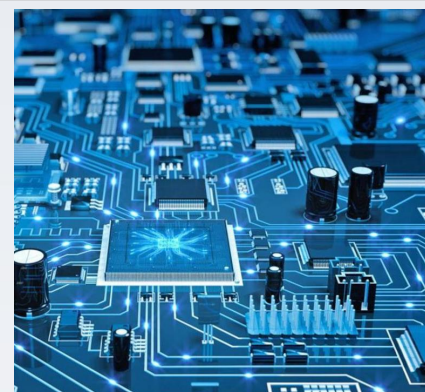
At the invitation of His Majesty Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck, the King of Bhutan, Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi visited Bhutan on a two-day State Visit from 11–12 November 2025. During the visit, PM was the Guest of Honour at the 70th Birth Anniversary celebrations of His Majesty the Fourth Druk Gyalpo at Changlimithang and joined the Global Peace Prayer Festival in Thimphu, which featured the Holy Piprahwa Relics of Lord Buddha for public veneration. Prime Minister Modi met His Majesty The King, the Fourth Druk Gyalpo, and Prime Minister Dasho Tshering Tobgay to discuss bilateral cooperation and regional issues. Bhutan also conveyed condolences on the Delhi explosion of 10 November.



During the visit, PM reaffirmed India's support for Bhutan's 13th Five Year Plan and the Economic Stimulus Programme, endorsed the vision for Gelephu Mindfulness City, and announced an Immigration Check Post at Hatisar, Assam to facilitate investor and visitor movement. A major highlight was the joint inauguration of the 1020 MW Punatsangchhu-II Hydroelectric Project, marking the start of electricity export to India. Both sides welcomed progress on the Punatsangchhu-I 1200 MW project and India's INR 40 billion concessional Line of Credit for Bhutan's energy sector.

Prime Minister Modi attends in G20 Summit in Johannesburg:

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi participated in the G20 Leaders' Summit hosted by President Cyril Ramaphosa of South Africa in Johannesburg on 22–23 November 2025. In the session on Inclusive and Sustainable Economic Growth, Prime Minister Modi highlighted progress under the South African presidency in skilled migration, tourism, food security, AI, digital economy, innovation, and women empowerment.

Prime Minister Modi met Prime Minister Anwar at G20 Summit:

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi met Malaysian Prime Minister Dato' Seri Anwar Ibrahim on the sidelines of the G20 Summit in Johannesburg where Prime Minister Modi reaffirmed India's readiness to work closely with Malaysia across a broad range of sectors. The discussion between the two leaders focused on advancing cooperation in key areas, including trade, economic partnerships, education, and emerging technologies — sectors that hold significant promise for expanding the breadth and depth of India–Malaysia relations.



Raksha Mantri Shri Rajnath Singh participated in the 12th ASEAN Defence Ministers' Meeting - Plus (ADMM-Plus) in Kuala Lumpur

Raksha Mantri Shri Rajnath Singh participated in a series of high-level defence engagements during the 12th ASEAN Defence Ministers' Meeting - Plus (ADMM-Plus) in Kuala Lumpur from 31 October to 1 November 2025, underscoring India's growing strategic role in the Indo-Pacific and its deepening partnership with ASEAN. During the 2nd India-ASEAN Defence Ministers' Informal Meeting, ASEAN Defence Ministers collectively hailed India as a responsible and stabilising superpower in the region.



The meeting offered an important opportunity to advance the ASEAN-India Comprehensive Strategic Partnership, particularly the defence and security priorities outlined in the ASEAN-India Plan of Action 2026–2030. Raksha Mantri announced two new initiatives—the ASEAN-India Initiative on Women in UN Peacekeeping Operations and the ASEAN-India Defence Think-Tank Interaction—aimed at strengthening institutional linkages and broadening the scope of cooperation. ASEAN Ministers expressed strong appreciation for India's contributions. In their remarks, the Ministers affirmed ASEAN's confidence in India's role as a key guarantor of regional stability; welcomed India's expanding defence industry and emphasised the importance of regional self-reliance; and called for greater joint activities, policy dialogue, and youth-level exchanges. Collectively, ASEAN Ministers supported India's initiatives and expressed eagerness to deepen the strategic partnership.

On 1 November 2025, Raksha Mantri addressed the 12th ADMM-Plus, speaking on “Reflection on 15 Years’ of ADMM-Plus and Charting a Way Forward.” He underlined that India’s engagement with ASEAN is principled and long-term, guided by the vision of an open, inclusive, and non-coercive Indo-Pacific. He commended Malaysia’s focus on “Inclusivity and Sustainability,” noting that these principles align with India’s broader security outlook, which integrates defence cooperation with economic development, technology sharing, and human resource advancement. Highlighting India’s active and constructive role in ADMM-Plus since its inception, he emphasized India’s co-chairing of multiple Expert Working Groups—on Humanitarian Mine Action, Military Medicine, HADR, and currently Counter-Terrorism with Malaysia. He stated that as ADMM-Plus enters its 16th year, India will continue to contribute meaningfully under the vision of “Mutual and Holistic Advancement for Security and Growth Across Regions (MAHASAGAR)”, ensuring that the Indo-Pacific remains stable, inclusive, and prosperous for all.

Raksha Mantri meeting with Defence Minister of Malaysia

On the sidelines of the ADMM-Plus (ASEAN Defence Ministers’ Meeting-Plus) in Kuala Lumpur, Raksha Mantri Shri Rajnath Singh held a productive meeting with Dato’ Seri Mohamed Khaled Nordin, the Defence Minister of Malaysia. The discussions focused on strengthening the India-Malaysia defence partnership, with an emphasis on exploring new avenues for cooperation to enhance regional peace, stability, and security. Both leaders expressed a shared commitment to deepening strategic ties and addressing common security challenges in the region.




Key Initiatives Announced to Strengthen India-Malaysia Cooperation

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi virtually attended the 22nd ASEAN-India Summit on 26 October 2025. During the summit, Prime Minister Modi and ASEAN leaders reviewed ongoing cooperation and explored ways to strengthen the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership, with a focus on political, economic, and developmental initiatives. On the sidelines, External Affairs Minister Dr. S. Jaishankar met with Malaysia’s Foreign Minister, H.E. Mohamad Hasan, to discuss opportunities to deepen India–Malaysia cooperation, particularly in emerging sectors, skill development, and people-centric initiatives.

In this context, following initiatives were announced:

- Registration of Indian-origin Malaysian nationals as Overseas Citizen of India (OCI) to be now extended up to sixth generation of descendants of Persons of Indian origin.
- The corpus of the Indian Scholarship and Trust Fund (ISTF) to be augmented by additional RM 3 Million. The ISTF provides annual one-time financial support to students from financially weaker families of the Malaysian Indian community.
- In pursuance of the decision to establish the Thiruvalluvar Chair of Indian Studies at the Universiti Malaya (UM) Kuala Lumpur, Prof. A Chellaperumal has joined at the UM as ICCR’s inaugural Thiruvalluvar Chair of Indian Studies in October 2025

Prime Minister Hon’ble Shri Narendra Modi virtually attended the 22nd ASEAN – India Summit on 26 October, 2025. External Affairs Minister Dr. S. Jaishankar represented Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi at the 20th East Asia Summit in Kuala Lumpur on 27 October, 2025.

2. On the sidelines of the ASEAN Summit and related Summit meetings, H.E. Dr Jaishankar met with Foreign Minister of Malaysia H.E Mr. Mohamad Hasan.

3. In this context, following initiatives would be implemented to further strengthen the people-to-people ties between India and Malaysia, and also to promote the ongoing academic and cultural engagements between the two countries:

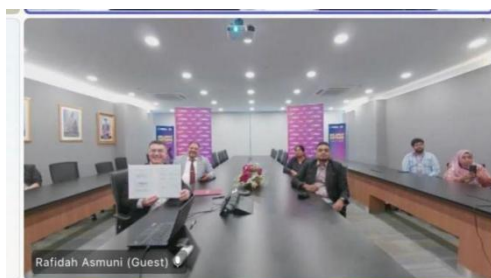
(i) Registration of Indian-origin Malaysian nationals as Overseas Citizens of India (OCI) to be now extended up to sixth generation of descendants of Persons of Indian Origin. The procedures being adopted to establish the ‘Indian Origin’ have been further revised for Malaysian applicants.

(ii) The corpus of the Indian Scholarship and Trust Fund (ISTF) to be augmented by additional Ringgit Malaysia (RM) 3 million. The ISTF provides annual one-time financial support to students from financially weaker families of the Malaysian Indian community.

(iii) In pursuance of the decision to establish the Thiruvalluvar Chair of Indian Studies at the Universiti Malaya (UM), Kuala Lumpur announced by Hon’ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi during the visit of Hon’ble Mr. Anwar bin Ibrahim, Prime Minister of Malaysia to India in 2024, Prof. A. Chellaperumal has joined at the UM as ICCR’s inaugural Thiruvalluvar Chair of Indian Studies earlier this month. Prof. A. Chellaperumal is a distinguished academic and anthropologist with over three decades of teaching, research, and administrative experience.

November 2025 also witnessed several pivotal agreements that further solidified the India-Malaysia partnership, with new collaborations spanning across education, technology, entrepreneurship, and healthcare.

- A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between IIT Madras Global and Malaysia's Advanced Semiconductor Academy (ASEM) was signed to boost semiconductor-related skilling and academic collaboration. This initiative will include a graduate programme in Computer Architecture and RISC-V Design, a Semester Exchange Programme, and a Joint Certificate Programme with the University of Selangor to enhance the Electrical and Electronic Engineering curriculum.
- On 6 November 2025, IIT Madras Global also participated in the inauguration of the Second IC Design Park in Cyberjaya, which was presided over by the Malaysian Prime Minister, highlighting the growing importance of the semiconductor sector in both countries.
- In another major development, an MoU between the National Small Industries Corporation (NSIC) of India and SME Corp Malaysia was signed to foster entrepreneurship, support MSMEs, and encourage bilateral business exchanges.
- In the healthcare and education sectors, an MoU between the Central Council for Research in Homeopathy (CCRH) and the University of Cyberjaya advanced academic collaboration in the field of homeopathy, paving the way for research and knowledge-sharing between the two nations.



The Department of Administrative Reforms & Public Grievances (DARPG), India and the Public Service Division (JPA), Malaysia jointly conducted the first JPA-DARPG Webinar on Performance Management in the Public Sector on 21 November 2025. The webinar was co-chaired by the Additional Secretary, DARPG, India and the Director, JPA, Malaysia, with senior officers from both sides and representatives from the Ministry of External Affairs in attendance. This webinar was part of a planned series under the Memorandum of Understanding on bilateral cooperation between India and Malaysia in public administration and governance reforms. During the session, the Malaysian side shared insights on Performance Management in the Public Sector (MyPERFORMANCE), while the Indian side presented Performance-Based Rewards, including the Prime Minister's Award for Excellence in Public Administration and e-Governance Awards.

On November 30, His Excellency the High Commissioner of India attended the final match, joining the Sultan of Perak and other dignitaries to witness the exciting finale. India finished as the runner-up, a proud achievement that reflects the team's continued growth and rising strength in international hockey.

1. India's foreign exchange reserves jump US\$ 5.54 billion to US\$ 692.57 billion

India's foreign exchange reserves surged by Rs. 49,395 crore (US\$ 5.54 billion) to reach Rs. 61,74,954 crore (US\$ 692.57 billion) during the week ended November 14, 2025, as disclosed by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) in its weekly statistical supplement released on November 21, 2025. This substantial increase effectively reversed the preceding week's decline of Rs. 24,073 crore (US\$ 2.70 billion), when reserves had dipped to Rs. 61,25,559 crore (US\$ 687.03 billion). 2. 58% of India GCCs invest in Agentic AI as innovation roles widen: EY survey

India's Global Capability Centres (GCCs) are decisively transitioning from artificial intelligence experimentation to full-scale enterprise deployment, with 58% currently investing in Agentic AI and an additional 29% planning to scale within the next year, according to the EY GCC Pulse Survey 2025 released on November 23, 2025. 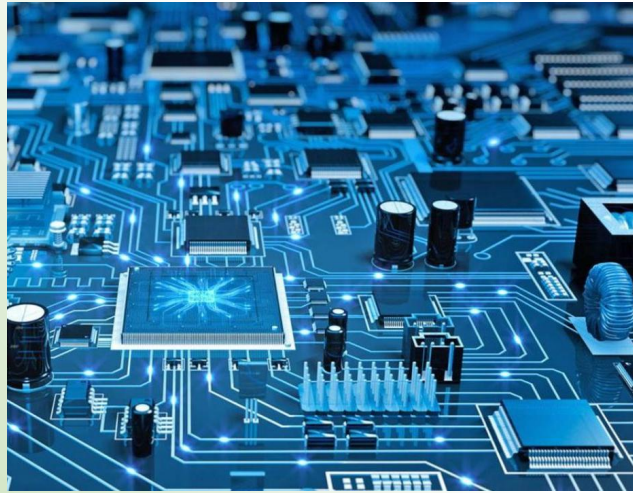

The approved units are spread across 9 states—Goa, Gujarat, Jammu & Kashmir, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh, and Andhra Pradesh, reinforcing the government's commitment to balanced regional growth and....[read more](#)

7. India's top 6 cities see 26% rise in new office supply, Pune Leads

India's top six cities recorded a 26% YoY rise in new office space supply to 16.1 million sq. ft. in Q3 CY25, driven by strong demand for premium workspaces from both global capability centres (GCCs) and domestic firms, according to Vestian. US-based real estate consultant Vestian data showed that the new supply of office space was the highest in Pune at 3.70 million sq feet during July-Sept period, an increase of...[read more](#)

Spotlight and Opportunities in India

Semiconductors & Electronics Manufacturing





- India is rapidly emerging as a key pillar in global semiconductor value chains, supported by the India Semiconductor Mission (ISM), which offers up to 50% fiscal support for semiconductor fabs and advanced packaging facilities. As of 2025, 10 major semiconductor projects with investments of nearly INR 1.60 trillion (US\$ 18.2 billion) have been approved. The Government has allocated nearly ₹629 billion (~US\$ 7.17 billion) in incentive funds.
- **Recent approvals:** Four new semiconductor factories were cleared in Odisha, Andhra Pradesh, and Punjab, including SiCSem (with UK's Clas-SiC) for India's first commercial SiC fab; 3D Glass Solutions Inc. for advanced packaging; CDIL for discrete devices; and ASIP Technologies (with South Korea's APACT) for ATMP with ~96 million units/year capacity.
- **HCL–Foxconn JV:** A fab near Jewar Airport, Uttar Pradesh, approved at ~₹37 billion, targeting 20,000 wafers/month and ~36 million display driver chips per year; operations are expected to start by 2027.
- **Strategic partnerships:** Announcements at Semicon India 2025 included Tata Electronics–Merck (materials and infrastructure for the Gujarat fab), Tata Electronics–C-DAC (design/IP via Chips-to-Startup and DLI), Kaynes Semicon collaborations (SPARSH-IQ, 3rdiTech, Focally, SenseSemi) for indigenous AI-vision modules, and Kaynes–Infineon for “Made-in-India” MEMS microphones and local power wafer packaging.
- **Manufacturing progress:** Micron is building a US\$ 2.75 billion ATMP facility in Sanand, Gujarat. Tata Electronics + PSMC (Taiwan) are constructing a fab in Dholera with 50,000 wafers/month capacity. Kaynes Semicon's Sanand unit will produce ~6 million chips/day.
- **Indigenous innovation:** India has developed its first fully indigenous 32-bit microprocessor (“Vikram 3201”), designed by ISRO/SCL Chandigarh, used in space missions.
- **Infrastructure pipeline:** ISM is developing “plug-and-play” semiconductor parks with strong land, power, and connectivity to accelerate project timelines.


